#### Divided


- Outer South

Republican Lock on the South 1980-2004 Red States and Purple States 2008-


#### Population Growth – Fast and Slow





#### Metro-Rural Gap







### South's Income Rises, Doesn't Catch Up






Median Income, South and US 1990-2010 Source: US Census Bureau




### Obama Lifted by Newcomers


## Awash in Red Counties
